





This will ensure PE is perceived as important. Staff accessed a range of CPD including team teaching alongside PE coaches from Burnley FC in the Community during the academic year; to develop confidence, skills and pedagogy. Mrs Hughes – PE subject leader attended termly leadership meetings via RSSP to develop knowledge and leadership skills for PE.
